# New York City Attractions

**The Empire State Building Observatory** – Located at 350 5<sup>th</sup> Ave between 33<sup>rd</sup> and 34<sup>th</sup> Streets right near Peen Station. The observatory here, in one of the world’s most famous buildings, gives you a spectacular view of the whole city.

**Rockefeller Center** - 49<sup>th</sup> to 52<sup>nd</sup> Streets, Fifth to Seventh Avenues. Enjoy the beautiful Channel Garden - delight in any season. Catch the summertime performances; watch the wintertime ice skaters, and marvel at the lavish decorations at Christmas including a giant tree. Window-shop the Center’s great stores. Relax in the beautiful parks and plazas amid Rockefeller Center’s soaring skyscrapers. Visit Trump Towers and St Patrick’s Cathedral. **Central Park Zoo** – Located at 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 64<sup>th</sup> Street. This jewel-like zoo in Manhattan has existed only since 1988 - yet its full history stretches back to the last century. The evolution of this city landmark launched the modern trend in urban zoos around the nation: the transformation of cages and menagerie-style zoos into natural habitat exhibits that educate, involve, and connect people to our natural world.

**New York Public Library** – Located at 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue & 42<sup>nd</sup> Street. Built in 1897 the vast paneled reading room stretches 2 full blocks and is suffused with day light from the 2 interior courtyards. Below it are 88 miles of shelves holding over 7 million volumes. Outside guarding the entrance meet the famous lions, Patient (facing the main entrance on the left) and Fortitude (facing main entrance on the right).

**Gardens: Formal & Natural** - Flora (and fauna) flourish in New York City's cultivated gardens and wildlife preserves. The Brooklyn Botanic Garden, The New York Botanical Garden, Bryant Park, The Conservatory Garden located in Central Park, Central Park Zoo and The Bronx Zoo.

**Religious Landmarks** - Food for the soul and impressive works of art and architecture abound at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Riverside Church, St. Bartholomew's Church, Temple Emanuel, St. Peter's Church at Citicorp Center, and the Abyssinian Baptist Church in Harlem, Trinity Church and St. Paul's Chapel in Lower Manhattan and the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church in Brooklyn (with its Louis Tiffany windows).

**Exotic Neighborhoods** - Chinatown, Greenwich Village, SoHo, TriBeCa, Yorkville, the Lower East Side, Little Italy, - see the "small towns" that make up The Big Apple. Lucky you if you're here for any of the street festivals: Chinese New Year (February), Ninth Avenue Festival (May), Queens Festival (June), Harlem Day (August), West Indian Day (Labor Day), La Fiesta di San Gennaro (September), Village Halloween Parade (October 31).

**Window Shopping** - Treasure-hunt along Fifth Avenue, Madison Avenue, Herald Square, 34<sup>th</sup> and 57<sup>th</sup> Streets (home of Macy's Herald Square). Browse the antique shops and boutiques along the Upper East Side, along Columbus Avenue, down in SoHo and Greenwich Village, and on Atlantic Avenue in Brooklyn. See the bargains on colorful Orchard and Delancey Streets in Manhattan and along 13<sup>th</sup> Avenue in Brooklyn.

**Top of the Rock Observation Deck** – The 55,000 square foot, tiered observation deck atop 30 Rockefeller Plaza offers an unforgettable experience, including a multi-media theater exhibit, glass-ceiling elevator ride to the TOP and panoramic 360-degree view from the 70<sup>th</sup> floor observatory, 850 feet in the sky! This is a perfect backdrop to start a tour of the City. Admission is, Adult \$7.50, Child \$11.25. Open daily 8 AM - midnight, (elevator stops running at 11PM).

**The Cloisters & Fort Tyron Park** - High on a hill at the northern tip of Manhattan at Fort Tyron Park. A magical “medieval monastery” with wonderful views of the Hudson. The Cloisters house the Metropolitan Museum of Art's medieval collections. The museum's most prized possessions are its 16<sup>th</sup> Century Unicorn Tapestries that tell the story of the “Hunt of the Unicorn.” A visit to the Cloisters takes the better part of the day. It's best to go in warm weather so you can wander the grounds. Hours are Tuesday – Sunday 9:30AM-5:15PM, November - February, Tuesday - Sunday 9:30AM - 4:45PM.

**Ellis Island** - half mile north of Liberty Island, the primary point of entry for immigrants to the U.S. from 1892 to 1924. Powerful black and white photographs, taped oral histories, and other exhibits recreate the immigrant experience. Visitors pass through the Baggage Room, the Registry Room, and the physical examination rooms. Ferries serve both the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island on the same trip. Ferry departs daily from South Ferry at Battery Park. Admission to the Monuments is free, but the ferry tickets cost adults \$10, seniors \$8, children \$4.

**Metropolitan Museum of Art** - 1000 5<sup>th</sup> Ave at 82<sup>nd</sup> St. The Met is a universal Art Museum containing world art in a comparative fashion. The Met boasts collections of almost everything from Egyptian to modern American paintings. Other departments include the Islamic art, the new South and Southeast Asian art collection and European Paintings. To do the Met justice takes a number of visits, so the best approach is to study the floor plan and decide what interest you most. Theater productions in New York are listed as “Broadway,” “Off-Broadway,” and “Off-Off Broadway.” The terms do not refer to geographic location, but to theater size and cost of production. “Broadway” shows are the big, expensive king, playing to audiences of over 500; “Off-Broadway” are smaller shows, playing to audiences of 100 to 499; and “Off-Off Broadway” are the smallest of all, with audiences of fewer than 100. Broadway productions lean toward the mainstream, and Off-Broadway productions—which began in the 1930s as a rebellion against Broadway values—almost equally so. Off-Off Broadway Theater was a 1960s’ rebellion against the rebellion; its shows are often quirky and experimental. For information on major shows and ticket availability, call the **NYC/ON STAGE** hotline at (212) 768-1818.

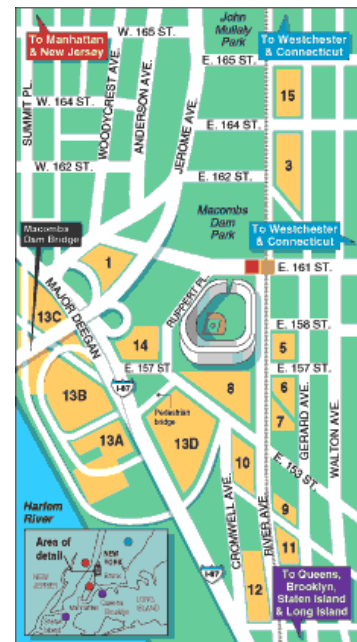

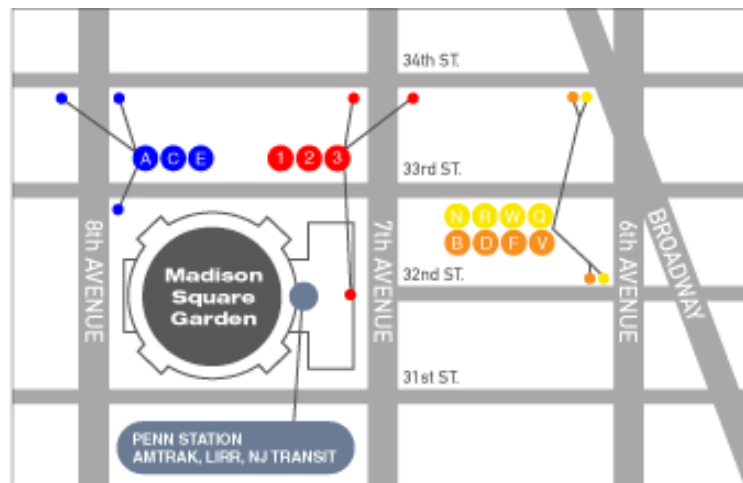

**Old Bethpage Village Restoration** - Old Bethpage. Open March - December (516) 572-8400. A pre-Civil War farm village with original structures moved from other parts of the Island, including a church, general store, tavern, craft shops, farm and residential homes.

**Sagamore Hill National Historic Site** - Oyster Bay. Open year round. Constructed by President Theodore Roosevelt in 1884-5, this 23 room Victorian mansion was his "Summer White House" from 1901 - 1909. Old Orchard Museum by Mr. & Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt Jr. in 1937-38; exhibits and audiovisual programs on Roosevelt's family life and career. Phone (516) 922-4447

**Vanderbilt Museum, Mansion, Marine Museum, Planetarium, Park** -Centerport. Open year round home of William Kissam Vanderbilt II. The 43 acre estate, Eagle's nest, contains fine and decorative arts, natural history collections gathered in the 1920's - 30's; lectures, workshops, concerts, special events. Planetarium programs include sky shows, laser shows, children and family astronomy programs, and night-sky observing sessions. Phone (516) 854-5555).

## Arboretums

**Bailey Arboretum** - Lattingtown, a Nassau County park, features 42 acres of exotic trees, rare shrubs and breathtakingly beautiful flowerbeds. It also features a unique Sensory Garden for the disabled and an interpretive nature trail. Phone (516) 572-0288.

**Old Westbury Gardens** - the former home of financier-sportsman John S. Phipps and his family is one of the few intact great Long Island estates open to the general public. In addition, it is one of the loveliest, having had eighty years in which to mature into what its designer and his client had intended. There are both informal walks and highly stylized gardens on the 100 acres of manicured grounds. The Italian Garden, for example, boasts the largest expanse of herbaceous borders in the United States and maintains the same color scheme through the various cycles of bloom. Open April -December Phone (516) 333-0048.

**Planting Fields Arboretum** - Oyster Bay, was the home of William Robertson Coe from 1910 to 1955. The Arboretum encompasses 409 acres; 160 acres of gardens and plant collections, 40 acres of lawns, and over 200 acres of woodlands and fields. There are two green house complexes totaling over one and a half acres, where native, tropical, and sub-tropical plants are cultivated under controlled temperature and atmospheric conditions. Coe Hall at Planting Fields, built in 1918, is one of the finest examples of Tudor Revival architecture in America. Open year round. Phone (516) 922-9201.

# Lighthouses

**Fire Island Lighthouse** - Robert Moses State Park. Grounds open year round. The first Fire Island Light blinked on in 1826 to guide ships to New York Harbor. The lighthouse, with its classic, beehive-shaped Fresnel lens throwing a beam 21 miles, went dark in 1974 and was replaced by an automated light on the water tower at adjacent Robert Moses State Park. The keeper's quarters now has a museum and gift shop and tours up the 192-step tower are available. Keeper's Quarters Visitor Center open weekends April-June and Labor Day-December. Wed.-Sun. July-Labor Day.

**Horton Point Lighthouse** - Southold. Open Memorial Day to Columbus Day including tours of the tower. Since 1847, the historic Horton Point Lighthouse has looked over a portion of Long Island Sound called Dead Man's Cove, so named in the late 17<sup>th</sup> century as testimony to the perilous glacial boulders lurking beneath its surface. The Lighthouse stands on an 110-foot bluff on an eight-acre site known early as Cliff Lot. Now operated by the Southold Historical Society, the Lighthouse features a Nautical Museum with journals kept at sea, sea chests, paintings, maps, scrimshaw, tools and various artifacts.

**Montauk Point Lighthouse** - Montauk Point. Open March - December and during the winter holiday weekends. This is the oldest lighthouse on Long Island and also the oldest in New York State, completed in 1796 on a spot where the royal Navy had maintained signal bonfires for its ships during the American Revolution. The Coast Guard operates the beacon, which was automated from a Fresnel lens to a 1,000-watt airport type beacon in 1987. The Montauk Historical society operates the visitor center and takes care of the grounds. Located at the easternmost tip of Long Island in the 724-acre Montauk State Park, the Lighthouse also features a museum and gift shop, and visitors can climb the 137 spiral steps to the top of the tower.

# Beaches

Long Island is bordered on the South Shore by hundreds of miles of clean, fine white sand beaches along both the ocean and the bay, surrounded by secluded dunes, cliffside bluffs and lighthouses. In fact, some of the world's best public beaches are located on Long Island featuring miles of boardwalks, beach trails, restaurants and the most spectacular sunrises and sunsets to be found anywhere. There are over 150 world-class beaches operated by federal, state, county, town and local municipalities. A few Long Island beaches are open only to local residents, but most, including 10 in state parks, are open to everyone. All beaches have either a parking or entrance fee from Memorial Day to Labor Day. These include the famous beaches in the Hamptons and along the rocky north shore cliffs, the Fire Island National Seashore stretching 26 miles through 17 beachfront communities and a natural wilderness area, and the largest of all Long Island beaches Jones Beach.
